PSAT testing for Juniors

The PSAT will be given at EHS on Wednesday, October 14th, during the regular school day. All junior students are encouraged to take this test. The test is 2 hours and 10 minutes with an additional 35 minutes for administrative duties. Students may register for this test October 6-9th. Students that register by October 9th will pay a \$15 test fee, fee increases to \$20 after that date. Students will register and pay (\$15 check made out to Eastlake HS) for the PSAT in the bookkeeper's office starting on October 6th. If this would be a financial hardship for your family please see Mrs. Cook in the Counseling Office. The PSAT is the official practice exam for the SAT and also the qualifying exam for National Merit Scholarships. Sophomores and non-Eastlake students will be tested on a space available basis and should put their name on a waiting list in the Counseling Office.

WSPTA Legislative Assembly

On October 2 and 3, representatives from PTA units all across Washington - including Eastlake PTSA - will gather in SeaTac for the annual WSPTA Legislative Assembly. Local units and councils will send delegates to the statewide Legislative Assembly to develop the WSPTA's legislative platform and to learn how to effectively advocate for children at all levels.

During the 2009 Legislative Assembly, the WSPTA will develop the second year of its two-year legislative platform. All issues that were placed on the platform at the 2008 Legislative Assembly will remain on the platform for this year and retain their rank order. At the 2009 Legislative Assembly we will address both proposed amendments to issues currently on the platform and new issues that will be voted on and ranked at the end of the current platform. The WSPTA will focus on the resulting platform during the coming Legislative Session in Olympia.

Senior Project begins for 09-10!

It's time once again for EHS Seniors to begin the year-long journey that is the senior project. The senior project offers students the opportunity to choose their own learning goals and create methods to achieve those goals that challenge their existing skills and knowledge. Although the senior project is an individual and independent project, students have access to a lot of support at EHS as they navigate sometimes unfamiliar waters.

All seniors have received (or will soon receive) a senior project handbook, which contains all guidelines as well as documentation forms and samples. Seniors have been working to prepare their Senior Project Proposals and will submit them to project panels on Monday, September 21. The first scheduled panel meeting is Wednesday, September 30, but seniors are strongly encouraged to introduce themselves to their panel teachers as soon as possible.

Panel teachers will once again use Webgrader to track and report senior project progress, and it will be important for students and parents to become accustomed to viewing "Detail Reports" and "Webnotes" as they use this tool. The first information about the status of senior project Proposals will be available after September 30.

Homeroom

September: In Homeroom this month students and teachers are re-connecting and getting to know the students who are new to Eastlake. Students will review the student handbook and bring home the Homeroom Syllabus and Academic Honesty/Attendance policies for parent/guardian review and signature. Sophomore TRIAD elections were held and students will attend an environmental assembly. Students will also review Eastlake club opportunities and attend a club fair. At the end of the month students will attend the Community Service Fair and discuss the various opportunities that our community has for service work.

October: The theme for October is: "Be Proactive". Be proactive is one of the 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens presented in the student planner. In Homeroom this month students will take part in an activity based on this theme. Students will also take part in Homecoming activities, a sports tournament and a pumpkin carving contest.



For the 2009-2010 school year the Lake Washington School District needed to cut 8 million dollars. The District, after hearing from the community, prioritized saving teacher’s jobs and maintaining class size. However, some programs had to be cut. All LWSU high schools lost the Advisory stipend, which at Eastlake caused the change from Advisory to Homeroom. Eastlake teachers agreed to implement a Homeroom, which has some similarities to Advisory but also some clear differences. According to the teacher contract Homeroom cannot incorporate “planning or grade reporting”; therefore, Eastlake cannot assimilate any curricular requirements in Homeroom and the credit is now based entirely on attendance. Therefore, the community service requirement has been removed from Homeroom. It’s an unfortunate situation and we are looking at other ways to include community service in the curriculum.

The chart below outlines many of the differences between Advisory and Homeroom.

Advisory	Homeroom
1/4 credit per semester	1/6 credit per semester
40 minutes	30 minutes
Graded A, C, F	Credit/No credit based on attendance
Community Service requirement for credit	No community service requirement for credit
Health and other curriculum	No planning or grade reporting

In the students planner this year, EHS has included aspects of the book, *Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens*. Homeroom will also be a time to learn about and discuss these life skills. The seven habits are as follows.

Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens

Be Proactive

Take responsibility for your life.

Begin with the End in Mind

Define your mission and goals in life.

Put First Things First

Prioritize, and do the most important things first.

Think Win-Win

Have an everyone-can-win attitude.

Seek First to Understand, Then to Be Understood

Listen to people sincerely.

Synergize

Work together to achieve more.

Sharpen the Saw

Renew yourself regularly

Finally, since Homeroom is based entirely on attendance the EHS staff is taking some extra measures to ensure consistent attendance. The Homeroom attendance policy is as follows.

Encouraging Attendance

Students gain privileges like receiving or maintaining an off-campus pass by attending regularly

1st unexcused absence – loss of off-campus privilege for two weeks or one hour of school service

2nd unexcused absence – loss of off-campus privilege for the remainder of the semester of 2 hours of school service

3rd unexcused absence – loss of Home Room credit

6 absences with one or more unexcused – loss of Home Room credit

- * Students still must attend even after losing credit
- *Disengagement and disruption will be a discipline issue

Seniors: Order Transcripts Early

The turn-around time for transcript preparation is three school days, so be sure to order them early. It is the student's responsibility to request, pick up, and mail these records in time to meet college deadlines. SAT and ACT scores are available directly from the testing agencies.

Annual Counselor Conference

Counselors will be attending the annual workshop sponsored by the Washington Council on High School and College Relations during the month of September in order to obtain up-to-date admissions data on in-state schools. Representatives from public and private colleges as well as technical colleges provide information about their schools.

During October counselors will meet with seniors to present various post-secondary opportunities and information. We will address post-secondary education and career plans, including the military, apprenticeships, 2-year and 4-year college options, applications and admissions, letters of recommendation, college test scores, and financial aid and scholarships.

NCAA Eligibility

Senior athletes: If there is a possibility that your student will participate in intercollegiate athletics at an NCAA Division I or II institution, it is necessary to submit the NCAA Initial-Eligibility form. The Clearinghouse has implemented online registration for prospective student-athletes. To register, visit the clearinghouse web site at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. From the home page, click on "Prospective Student-Athletes."

Senior Graduation Check

Now that schedule changes have been completed and class load levels have been balanced, counselors will be checking graduation requirements and academic histories for every senior. Twelfth graders must be enrolled in either Senior Connections, AP English, or UW Composition **and** US Citizenship or AP Government. In October, letters will be sent home if a student is either scheduled for class(es) required for graduation or is in danger of not having the required coursework and/or sufficient credits for graduation. Please watch the mail if you have any concerns regarding your student.

Monthly College Planning Calendar

It's never too early to plan for college! The National Association for College Admissions Counseling website provides a monthly college planning calendar, which is divided into each grade level. Check it out for tips to help your student prepare for college: www.nacacnet.org/MemberPortal/ForStudents/CollegePrep/. Below are the recommendations for seniors during the month of September.

- Make sure you have all applications required for college admission and financial aid. Write, phone, or use the Internet to request missing information.
- Check on application and financial aid deadlines for the schools to which you plan to apply. They may vary and it is essential to meet all deadlines!
- Meet with your guidance counselor to be sure your list includes colleges appropriate to your academic and personal record. Review your transcript and extra-curricular records with your school counselor to ensure their accuracy.
- Register for the October/November SAT Reasoning Test and/or SAT Subject Tests, or September/October ACT.
- If the colleges require recommendations, ask the appropriate people to write on your behalf. At least three weeks before the due date, ask your counselor and teachers, employers, or coaches to write letters of recommendation. Provide recommendation forms, any special instructions and a stamped, addressed business envelope to the people writing your recommendation. Be thoughtful! Write thank-you notes to those who write recommendations and keep them informed of your decisions.
- Plan visits to colleges and set up interviews (if you didn't get to them during the summer or if you want to return to a campus for a second time). Read bulletin boards and the college newspaper. Talk with current students and professors.

PSAT

All juniors will be given the opportunity to take the Preliminary SAT[®]/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQ) on Wednesday, October 14. It is a co-sponsored program by the College Board and [National Merit Scholarship Corporation](http://www.nmsc.org). It's a standardized test that provides firsthand practice for the SAT Reasoning Test[™]. It also gives students a chance to enter National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) scholarship programs. The PSAT measures critical reading, math problem-solving, and writing skills.

The most common reasons for taking the PSAT/NMSQT are:

- to receive feedback on your strengths and weaknesses on skills necessary for college study. You can then focus your preparation on those areas that could most benefit from additional study or practice.
- to enter the competition for scholarships from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (grade 11 only).
- to help prepare for the SAT. Students can become familiar with the kinds of questions and the exact directions on the SAT.
- to receive information from colleges when "yes" is checked on Student Search Service.
